TOWNS & VILLAGES Little places, big stories

Mark and Jo Richardson, Greens Mandurama Rural Service Centre, Mandurama

Mark and Jo moved back to Mandurama in 2001 to assist Jo's parents in running the rural merchandise business they own today. Jo grew up in the area around Burnt Yards and Errowanbang. They say Mandurama has been a great place to bring up their own two children with their love of space, farming and community drawing them back to the area to make their home.

Mandurama was originally established for the staff of Coombing Park – one of the first farms settled in the district. Today, Mandurama is a quaint village with a great deal of history – set amongst rolling hills, creeks and rivers. Mandurama is a town that fosters community, with a beautiful community hall available for hire and a park with an undercover area with picnic tables, free BBQ's and children's play equipment as well as the local tennis courts.

Streets that run North to South are named after fruit; Peach, Olive, Loquat and Cherry and streets that run East to West are named after Metals; Gold, Silver and Copper.

Their top 3 local recommendations are:

- Junction Reefs on the banks of the Belubula River picnic or camping area and historic dam wall.
- Bakers Shaft Reserve Camping also on the Belubula River
- Millamolong Polo Polo tournaments, generally in the Autumn or Spring.









Chris Cuddy, Perenialle Plants, Canowindra

Chris Cuddy has lived in Canowindra for almost 23 years; 12 of these have been spent running Perennialle Plants. The business started as a mail order nursery specialising in rare, and frost and dry tolerant plants. The demand for the plants grew and the business evolved and expanded to include garden tools and giftware. Perennialle Plants now inhabits a beautifully restored 1909 building which houses an extensive emporium, the nursery and a cafe. The business has become an important fixture on the main street, open long and regular hours, and one of the many cafes in town.

Chris describes Canowindra as "a fantastic little town of about 2000 people. It's a special place, from the historic main street to the welcoming atmosphere. There's a real sense of community and creativity in the place."

Chris' top 3 recommendations while in Canowindra:

- Start at the eastern end of the main street with a coffee and fresh pastry at Perennialle Plants followed by a slow wander through the nursery and emporium.
- Meander down the rest of the historic "bendy' main street, enjoying the buildings and other retail offerings and art galleries. Lunch can be purchased from one of the excellent local cafes.
- Make sure to stop in at the world class Age of Fishes Museum: one of only two fish fossil museums in the world, and a National Heritage site due to its international scientific significance.





Steeped in rich farming history and industry, the historic town of Blayney is home to a friendly, vibrant community enjoying modern facilities among elegant 19th century houses and treasured traces of the past.

The town of Blayney is the centre of the historic villages of Blayney Shire. Take a drive along the country roads to the villages and enjoy the spectacular views and landscapes.

DID YOU KNOW

Established in 1844, the town has a fascinating colonial history, including the fact that in 1863, the whole town was bailed up in a pub for three days by Ben Hall's bushranger gang.

The world-renowned Devonian 360-million-year-old Fish Fossils were discovered here in 1956 and many of these are now on display at the Age of Fishes Museum touted by Sir David Attenborough as an NEARBY extraordinary collection.

Located in Canowindra, the dig location is listed as a National Heritage site due to its international scientific significance. The museum is also home to a Science Education and Research Hub and Visitor Information Centre and Gift Shop.

DID YOU KNOW

Established in 1839, Carcoar is the third-oldest settlement west of the Blue Mountains.

Classified by the National Trust because of its large number of preserved 19th century buildings. Highlights include well-preserved Victorian buildings along the main street, St Paul's Anglican Church built in 1848, the century-old courthouse, and the 1849 convict-built stables of Stoke House, believed to be the oldest building in the village.

DID YOU KNOW

Established in 1885, Cudal was built on important road in the region once used to transport gold. The old EW Corden Store building offers a step back in time to experience rural life as it was over 60 years ago. It remains the best example of early 20th century architecture and is now home to the community hub known as The Cabonne Food, Wine and Cultural Centre.





Rich in sporting and community culture, Cumnock is now firmly on the map with the Animals on Bikes Paddock Art trail; over 100 sculptures along 120 km between Molong and Dubbo Zoo, via Cumnock and Yeoval. The rolling hills surrounding Cumnock are well regarded for sheep and wool production, cattle and grain.





DID YOU KNOW

Established in 1865, Cumnock was first settled as a farming community. The village is known as a rugby legend breeding ground; having produced five Australian Wallaby players, all of whom lived down Burgoon Lane!

DID YOU KNOW

Eugowra is the heart of bushranger country. It was at nearby Escort Rock that infamous Frank Gardiner and his gang pulled off the biggest gold robbery in Australian history.

The granite in Parliament House, Canberra was mined and processed from the Eugowra district.

Alf Cantrell and wife Sharon have been at the heart of the Yeoval community since they purchased their home there thirty-three years ago. A glorious 360 kilometre multi-day lap of Mount Canobolas, where riders get to enjoy quiet roads, smooth gravel, terrific views and most importantly, fabulous country hospitability in local towns and villages in the heart of Regional NSW.

Set in the heart of Wiradjuri Country, people can explore historic sites, wineries, cideries, towns, villages and events all year round. Orange to Molong

(55kms)

Getting riders out of Orange and into the surrounding countryside to experience the Mount Canobolas high country is the first stage of this ride. Travel through typical Central West Slopes rural landscape on the way to Molong.



Molong to Cargo

(70kms)

Landscapes and vistas between 4 local villages make this the perfect stage to capture photos. Riders will enjoy agricultural variety, including cattle, sheep, and alpacas, as well as stunning canola crops in spring or the seasonal cropping of wheat.



Cargo to Cowra

(68kms)

Emerge from the foothills of Mount Canobolas as you take in the gentle rolling hills of Cargo, Canowindra and Cowra with very little climbing and skirt onto the fertile river flats of the Lachlan River.



Cowra to Neville

(84kms)

There are two options with a combination of sealed and unsealed road surfaces on this route. Riders on e-bikes will have an advantage on the climbs, however there is no opportunity to recharge bikes during the ride.

A note of caution about Snake Creek Road: this is best crossed on a mountain bike. It's a track though interesting eucalypt forest, and with a causeway (beware, you might get wet feet).



Neville to Carcoar

(35kms)

This is Ben Hall country and as this stage is a shorter journey there is ample time to stop and enjoy the views and the historic village of Carcoar. The ever-present vista towards Mount Canobolas is a feature of this route. Those in a hurry can continue to Millthorpe or Orange if an afternoon in Carcoar does not fit.



Carcoar to Orange (55kms)

After a cheeky coffee in Millthorpe, riders head west and under the low-level railway bridge. The ride along Forest Reefs Road passes lovely houses on acreage, each with their own style of house, garden and old wares (such as old cars and windmills). This is a lovely quiet road with views to the west to Mt Canobolas, across grazing and farming country beside the road.

Riders marvel in their thoughts along this next part of the ride. Spring Hill, Spring Terrace, Springside and Spring Creek are amongst the local names. Why would that be?
